

Chapter One

All Christians have faith.
It's a requirement. You have to
have faith to believe in the birth,
death, and resurrection of Jesus,
as well as to believe that He died
for your sins and that accepting
Him as your Savior redeems you from
your sins. But that's where our
faith begins and ends so often.
Some people believe that becoming a
Christian is the solution to all

their problems and fail to use the same faith that made them

Christians in the first place in their daily lives. Even those who study the Bible and read about the miraculous things that happened to those who had faith don't think any of that applies to their personal day-to-day living.

However, there are many

Christians who have great faith and demonstrate that faith throughout their lives in many ways. Most of these people do not have big, showy miracles that demonstrate their faith. Often, it's the little ways that their faith is manifested that show just how strong their faith

is. One such woman lives in Toledo, Ohio. She is a devout Christian who has lived a long and sometimes hard life, but who has always counted on her faith to pull her through difficult times. Probably her most difficult time was during the Great Depression.

This woman of God saw poverty so great, many people today cannot even conceive of the level of lack she experienced. Her husband was employed but made very little money and her family suffered greatly.

She had two children who depended on their school lunch during the week to have at least one meal a day because all too often there was

no food in the house. So, this housewife would give each of them a nickel every day to purchase their lunch at school and save what little food they had for the weekend, often just eating a scrap of bread or some broth herself to get her through. When her husband was between jobs for a short time, the family had a hard time getting even the little money needed for subsistence.

One day, she didn't have the ten cents for her children's lunch money. Her husband had just gotten a new job and he was getting paid that same day, but most of the money had to be used to pay the

past due rent and utilities. She had to make sure her children got lunch at school in case there wasn't enough money left after all the bills were paid to buy food to get them through the weekend. She got up early in the morning and went down into the basement to wash her husband's only other pair of pants and shirt so they would be dry the next day for him to wear to work. It was two hours before her children had to leave for school and she wondered how she would get that dime to pay for their lunch. Tears ran down her face as she thought of her children hungry all day and maybe all weekend.

Suddenly, she fell to her knees on top of her husband's pants and shirt and prayed out loud.

"Lord, you know my need and my sorrow," she began. "I ask not for me, but for my children. You told us you would supply all our needs and I don't have but one right now. Just one dime, just one dime to buy them lunch today and I won't worry about tomorrow because I know if you give me what I need now, you'll just keep on filling my cup. Give me the ten cents to buy my children's lunch today, Lord God, and I will bless your name all the days of my life. I ask this in Jesus' sweet and Holy name, Amen."

She arose from her knees as peace settled over her and she said over and over, "Thank you, Jesus. Thank you, Jesus." She repeated this while she put the clothes in the wringer washer and filled it up, then started sweeping the floor. She began humming a hymn and thinking about the goodness of God and felt like shouting and dancing all over her basement. But before she could do either, she saw a pile of rags behind an old tire in the corner of the basement. Afraid mice might build a nest there she pulled the old mildewed clothing out of the corner using her broom, realizing it was an old pair of

coveralls her husband had worn out on a previous job during more prosperous times.

Carefully, she picked the moldy smelling clothing up to take it over to the trash can by the stairs and heard something fall to the floor. Whatever it was tinkled like a coin. Thinking it was a penny, she looked at it thinking that all she needed was nine more if it was. What she saw caused her to throw up her hands and let out that shout she'd started just moments earlier and dance around her basement waving that broom and thanking the Lord.

"Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Glory

to God! Praise your name! I thank
you, Lord! None is greater than the
Almighty! God, I give you all the
glory and the praise! Hallelujah!
Hallelujah!"

When she couldn't shout any
longer, she just stood there and
cried, overcome by gratitude and
joy. She was sure she had awakened
her children, but they were used to
her shouting and didn't come to see
what all the commotion was about in
the basement. So, she just stood
there until she was able to bend
over and pick up the shiny dime on
the cement floor. Never in all of
her life could she have imagined
that she would be that happy to see

a single dime, but that one coin was the answer to her prayer and the fulfillment of her need.

Telling that story, this woman of faith said she never had another day of lack. Her husband's new job paid enough to feed her family two meals a day at home and to supply their children with the ten cents they needed for lunch, as well as paid all their bills. He stayed employed with the company that hired him toward the end of the Depression until he retired and they were able to send both of their children to college. Just as she'd stated in her prayer, once she exercised her faith to fulfill

one need, the fulfillment of that
need sustained her faith and she
knew all her needs would be met
from then on. Such is the power of
faith.

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Chapter Two

This story of how a woman used her faith to get ten cents provides us with a step-by-step method of using faith to manifest abundance.

Many books have been written on this subject, often involving laws of "attraction," or some other such catch phrase or buzzword. However, although these methods all require faith, they do not tell you how to have faith. Usually, they tell you

to visualize what you want or repeat statements called affirmations that you already have it. They basically are asking you to try to make yourself believe something that is not true. That's where these methods fail.

Sure, sometimes people are able to manifest the things they are trying to attract, but often that's because they are also doing things to attract the things they are after, such as actively going out to look for them. For example, before I returned to my Christian roots, I tried metaphysics or New Thought methods and when I wanted a

piano, I cleared a space in my apartment for it. Then I visualized seeing it there, seeing myself playing it, and kept repeating "I enjoy playing my new piano" every day. I even told some of my friends and co-workers that I was getting a piano.

I frequently went to a nearby mall and played piano in a music store located there. One day, shortly after I started using the law of attraction to get a piano, a salesman in the store walked over to me and offered to finance a piano for me. So, I signed the papers and bought a piano for

eleven hundred dollars through a well-known financing company. I enjoyed that piano the rest of the time I lived in that city, moving it to a home I bought, then to another apartment when financial difficulties made it impossible to renovate the older house. Finally, I left that city nearly destitute, despite having a fulltime job, and sold the piano for \$400. I was unable to pay off the loan or any of the many other debts I owed and needed the money I got for the piano to start a new life in another city.

While I was making a phone call on the public phone in the

lobby of my apartment building the day I left town because my phone had been disconnected, I left my door open because I could see my apartment in a mirror that showed the entire hallway from the lobby.

However, I turned away from the mirror to keep my conversation private and an elderly couple on a fixed income who lived across the hall apparently went into my apartment and took one of the four one hundred dollar bills in my wallet.

One of the saddest sights I've ever seen was that couple walking arm in arm to the bank as I left for the airport later that

afternoon. I had given them all of my dishes and cookware and knew it must have been hard for them to take money from me and that they must have really needed it. I was angry, but grateful that they didn't take the entire amount I'd been paid for the piano. It was years before I realized that the method I used to get the piano was fraught with flaws. This fact was made quite pointedly when all of my creditors except the company that financed my piano wrote off my debts, giving me a bad credit rating which I deserved. However, that company followed me across the country, hounding me with

exorbitant interest and fees on what was left of that eleven hundred dollar debt.

Every time I got a notice from them, I regretted ever getting that piano, although it had brought me many moments of pleasure and was used to create a great deal of music. The problem was not with the piano, but with the method I used to "attract" it or manifest it in my life. It wasn't an act of faith, but an act of will on my part. I willed myself to get a piano and went out and got myself into debt I couldn't afford because I wanted something so badly I was willing to do anything to get except the one

thing that could have gotten a piano given to me just as the piano I'd had prior to buying that one had been given to me. That piano had been left in an apartment when I didn't have a place to move it to after being evicted by my landlord when his daughter returned home to live in the apartment that was actually hers and having to move in with a friend who didn't have any place for my piano or the rest of my furniture.

The difference in my getting a piano that I wanted badly and the woman getting a dime that she needed was not just want versus need, but faith versus will. I

could have used faith to get something I really wanted just as she used faith to get something she really needed. I just didn't know how. However, after listening to her, I learned the most valuable lesson I'd learned as a Christian since I learned why Jesus had to shed His blood for my sins. I was overjoyed and overcome. I couldn't believe how simple it was. All I needed was faith! I didn't have "attract" what I wanted or needed, repeat any false statements or "affirmations" to myself, or put forth the effort to make sure what I wanted was coming to me. All I had to do was ask, seek, and knock,

just like it says in the Bible.

"Ask, and it shall be given you; seek, and ye shall find; knock, and it shall be opened unto you: For every one that asketh receiveth; and he that seeketh findeth; and to him that knocketh it shall be opened." (Matt. 7:7-8)

How many times have we heard those words and not understood what they mean? Most Christians believe that verse instructs them to do three separate things when actually all you are doing is one. This verse is telling you to ask God, seek God, and knock at the Gate. How do you do this? Through prayer! Look at the prayer the woman of faith prayed. She asked God to meet her need, sought Him through

His word when she reminded Him that
He promised to supply all her
needs, then she finalized her
prayer when she knocked on the Gate
by vowing to bless God all the days
of her life, since she had nothing
else to give but her praise, then
offering up her praise through the
repetition of her gratitude *before*
she received a single dime. The end
of the verse says when you ask, you
will receive; when you seek, you
will find; and when you knock on
the Gate, it shall be opened.

*Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that
there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now
herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open
you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a*

*blessing, that there shall not be room enough to
 receive it. And I will rebuke the devourer for your
 sakes, and he shall not destroy the fruits of your
 ground; neither shall your vine cast her fruit before
 the time in the field, saith the Lord of hosts. " --*

Malachi 3:8-11

Lacking anything to tithe but
her praise, in her moment of need,
this woman offered to bless the
Lord with her praise the rest of
her days and demonstrated her
intent by giving him her praise as
soon as she ended her prayer,
repeatedly thanking Him for
something He had not yet given her
with the expectation, having sought
His word after asking that her need
be met, that once she completed her

prayer, it was answered and she would receive what she needed. All she wanted was a single dime, but that dime might as well have been a million dollars because **the same**

faith it takes to manifest a million dollars was required to manifest that one dime.

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Chapter Three

Although asking, seeking, and knocking are how we marshal our faith and put it to work for us, this first step is preceded by two other all important steps and followed by two more. Before the woman asked, sought, or knocked on anything, she felt an urgent need or desire within her mind, body, and soul and acknowledged it. Have you ever wanted something so badly, you could feel it? The desire for

it settles in the pit of your stomach and clouds your thoughts, unsettling your spirit. You can't think of anything else and may become physically ill and spiritually moved to the point of needing to fast and pray because the desire is so overwhelming.

What do you do when you want or need something that badly? If you ignore your desire, you may become physically and/or emotionally ill. However, if you acknowledge and get confirmation from God that this is a legitimate desire, you can then exercise your faith to obtain what you desire. Make sure what you desire lines up

with God's word because you cannot use faith to get someone else's husband or wife, land or possessions, or to avenge a perceived wrong, destroy another person, or wish any ill on anyone or anything. That is not a legitimate desire. If you're not sure what a legitimate desire is, read the Bible, especially the Ten Commandments in the Old Testament and Paul's instructions to churches in the New Testament and you will know what is and is not allowed by God's law.

Public acknowledgement of your desire is not required but is allowed among believers. Just be

careful with whom you share this information because not everyone will wish you well. Even among Christians there is jealousy and envy and when these spirits are released, it will be harder for you to exercise your faith while fighting off demonic forces. Often it is best to keep your desires to yourself unless you have a proven and trusted friend, confidant, or spiritual leader you can talk to about it. What's most important is that you acknowledge your deep-felt desire to yourself. Meditate on it, thinking about what it would mean for it to be fulfilled. Make it a reality in your spirit by creating

a scenario that shows you with that
desire met and how you would think,
speak, and act once you get it.

Move from the spirit to the
corporeal imagining all of the
sensations that will be involved
with having your desire fulfilled.

For example, I did this step
when I wanted a piano badly and
cleared that space in my apartment
for it, then imagined myself
sitting at the piano playing it and
how that felt, sounded, and even
smelled. Had I taken the next and
most important step in getting that
desire - asking, seeking, and
knocking - I would have not had to
go out and obtain my desire by

becoming indebted only to sell the piano at a loss and then have part of the money I was paid stolen, as well as having to endure being hounded by a bill collector for over thirty years because I didn't know what to do next to get my desire. This is where many such methods collapse, when they leave God out of the equation and instruct people to use their own will to obtain their desires.

Human will is a formidable force and can be used to obtain almost anything. It is human will that is often used to conquer other nations, overthrow companies, win the hand of a beloved, discipline a

child, but are these lasting victories? Many times when will alone is used to achieve victory, the victory is short-lived and hollow because it is a victory waged through fear, force, and intimidation. Faith requires none of these things. It only requires belief. You are not believing in anything when you have to go out and get what you need through your own puny efforts. Compared to God's, your attempts to obtain what you desire are inadequate because you don't know all the variables, whereas an all-seeing, all-knowing God does.

Now, many Christians believe

their efforts are required as a step in the process of exercising faith because "faith without works is dead." The works are usually perceived to be some action on our part to put our faith into gear and get the ball rolling. The thing you have to do is believe. However, that scripture is not talking about doing something to exercise your faith. It is talking about what you have to show for your faith.

What good is it, my brothers, if someone says

he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him? If a brother or sister is poorly clothed and lacking in daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace, be warmed and filled," without giving them the things needed for the body, what good is that? So also

faith by itself, if it does not have works, is dead. But someone will say, "You have faith and I have works."

Show me your faith apart from your works, and I will show you my faith by my works. (James 2:14-18 ESV)

The works are the

manifestation of your faith, not

what you do to get results! You

don't do anything to get it. If you do it, it won't manifest from the spiritual realm and you may end up like me: in debt, robbed, and harassed. That's not a

manifestation of faith. That's business as usual. That's you

trying to do God's work. Faith is letting God have control once you feel a desire, acknowledge, and go to Him to ask, seek, and knock;

then complete the rest of the steps
that will result in you in you
receiving what you desire.

Understand that once you do just
the three things outlined already,
your faith will be manifested.

However, in order to receive that
manifestation, there is something
else you have to do. Then, in order
to sustain the manifestation of
your faith, there are other steps
that you have to take. The woman of
faith did all of the above.

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Chapter Four

Expecting your desire to be manifest is a vital next step in receiving it. It's already manifested once you have asked, sought, and knocked, but in order to receive it, you have to first expect it. Think about the things in which we have faith just in our everyday life. You expect the chair you sit in to eat breakfast to hold your body. You expect to get paid when you work two weeks for your

employer and turn in a timesheet.
You expect your bank to clear a
check you've written to pay a bill
when you know you have money in
your checking account. Expectation
is always there when you are sure
of the outcome. Once you've gone to
God to ask Him to give you your
desire, seeking in His word His
promise to do just that, knock on
His Gate by offering up your tithe,
giving Him your praise (in addition
to or lacking money) instead of ten
percent of your income, you should
have the "blessed assurance" that
you will receive what you desire.

This is where belief is needed.
If you believe in God and His word,

you will have the expectation that God will keep His promise to fulfill a need you've acknowledged and have gone to Him to have met. Now, this may be the hardest step for many people. Belief in God's word requires the same faith required to become a Christian. You can't do it with logic, reason, or the scientific method. You just have to know that it is true. If you believe that God is willing and able to fulfill your need, you are almost ready to receive it. So, how does someone having trouble believing get through this step and closer to receiving the manifestation of his or her faith?

If you are having difficulty believing, you need to spend some time in prayer, reading scripture, and perhaps even fasting. Continue to fast, pray, and study God's word until you are filled with the expectation that you are going to receive what you desire because God has already given it.

Expectation for manifestation of your desires is not something that you force through visualizations, affirmations, or any other "actions." It's something you feel. You don't visualize yourself sitting in a chair nor do you say "This chair will hold me" before you sit in it. You just sit

it in with the expectation that you will be supported. If you have reason to doubt that a chair is sturdy enough to hold you, you won't sit in it. The same is true of your faith. If your expectation that your desire will be met is not strong enough, you won't "sit in it." In order for you to relax and sit comfortably assured that your expectation is assured, you have to believe.

Believing results from strong faith. But how do you get the faith to believe in the first place? Go back to the word. Sometimes it's not enough to study the word on your own or meditate alone while

you fast and pray. Sometimes you will need help through Bible study with a friend or, better yet, under the guidance of a spiritual leader.

"So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God. But I say,

Have they not heard? Yes verily, their sound went into all the earth, and their words unto the ends of the world."

• ***Romans 10:17–18*** (quoting Psalm 19:14)

Once you have that

expectation, you are ready for the last step in receiving your desire. All you have to do now is listen to the Holy Spirit. Again, this is often difficult for many people.

Too many Christians rely too much on their own reasoning ability and

too little on the unction of the Holy Spirit to direct their lives and actions. If you feel “something” telling you to do take an action, no matter how small, do it. The means to receiving your desire rest in the spiritual realm, not the physical as proven by scripture.

Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.
[Hebrews 11:1]

You can't see the evidence of your faith because it resides in the spiritual realm until you release it with your need, acknowledgement of your need, and by going to God to ask, seek, and

knock. Once released into the physical, you find it by expecting it and listening for directions. Those directions are given to you from the same place that manifested your need: the spirit. Listen for the voice of the Holy Spirit giving you directions to do or say something that will lead you to where your desire has manifested. It could be something as simple as picking up a rock, turning in a different direction than the one you usually go when walking your dog, watching the evening news on a different channel than your regular one, shopping at a different grocery store, buying a book that

catches your eye in the book store,
or being prompted to share your
feelings with a friend.

Spirit moves through others to
operate in the physical, so it is
often through others that we find
the manifestation of our desires. I
usually stay at a hotel when I
write and, while on one of my

"writing retreats," I was in the
hotel lobby having my continental
breakfast and started talking to a
seemingly friendly gentleman about
a variety of subjects, eventually
getting around to politics. I
mentioned that I was a journalist
and had just left a paper where I'd
worked for six years and he told me

that he knew about an online newspaper that was looking for writers. He didn't have a web address, but gave me the name. I went back to my room and used a search engine to find the newspaper and the next day told him I found it and put in an application. It took several months, but I eventually got a job with the newspaper I found out about just by talking to someone and sharing my previous experience as a newspaper reporter.

In another example, I was talking to a friend who applied for a job in radio after completing a course in broadcasting and I shared

with her that I was offered a job as a jingle writer for a radio station the day I left the city mentioned previously in the story about the piano. I'd been asked to write a score for a brief documentary and the day I left, my friends who produced the documentary, took me to record my score before taking me to the airport. My fifteen minute score was recorded in the recording studio of a local radio station. When the gentleman producing the recording heard me play and sing, he offered me a job as a jingle writer on the spot. He was very disappointed when I told him I was

moving to another state.

When I shared this story with my friend, she told me that she knew of several radio stations in a city an hour from my present residence where she was hoping to find a job that were looking for jingle writers. She promised to get contact information for me. Still in the interview process for the job as of the writing of this book, she has not been able to get those contacts for me yet, but I have every expectation that she will get the job and that I will get those contacts.

Often people are reluctant to share this kind of information

because they don't want to blow their own horn and feel that they will sound arrogant and self-serving. Actually, the opposite is true. Arrogant, self-serving people do not share information with others. They just give information about themselves. Just as the friend I mentioned offered to give me information, I have shared information with countless people that has lead to them receiving things they desired. For example, before I left my newspaper job, a friend told me about a friend of his who was writing for another paper and was dissatisfied. I arranged for her to meet my editor

and told our mutual friend how she should approach him and what she should be prepared to do to prove her journalistic skills. She followed these instructions and got a job at the newspaper, replacing me when as a reporter when I left. I was very pleased. When I left a job as a staff supervisor, I heavily lobbied for a friend of mine who had tried again and again to get a job in management to replace me and she was given the position. This is called networking and it's something Christians should do to support and promote each other.

Listening for the Holy Spirit

does not have to be a mystical experience where you hear voices and see visions, although you *may* hear and see these things. It may be something very simple and ordinary, as previously mentioned. It may just be a hunch. Follow your "Holy Ghost Hunches." I've learned to do this in even the tiniest ways. If I am directed to put something in my purse that I see as I am leaving my house I do it and sure enough it's something I need later on that day and that I am glad I have available. Listening to the Holy Spirit has become a habit for me, making life so much easier.

Chapter Five

You now have what you desired!

Imagine how that feels. Make it a sensory experience: seeing yourself, the expression on your face; feeling the exultation, and joy of having your greatest desire realized; hearing the sound of your own exclamations of rejoicing. Now and only now is your opportunity to guarantee that what your desire will be yours without conditions or fear of loss and that your faith

will increase and continue to manifest the Godly desires of your heart.

The first thing you should do when you receive something you have desired, prayed for, believed for, and finally obtained is acknowledge your source - God. Remember, how the woman of faith starting shouting "Hallelujah!" before she even picked up the dime that was the one thing she needed *and* desired more than anything in the world? Her words of praise not only kept the promise she made to God to praise Him all the days of her life, but they acknowledged that it was God, not her, not a

visualization, affirmation, or a "law of attraction," but God who gave her the desire of her heart.

This acknowledgement is the difference between obtaining something through faith that is yours to keep once you get it and getting something through your own will like I did that piano and not being able to keep it because your source was not God. Make no mistake, even when God is your source, if you do not acknowledge Him as the one and only source of your met need, the contract has not been completed and you don't have possession of that need yet. You have to acknowledge that what you

received came from God so that God can complete the transaction by declaring that what was given is yours and yours alone. Once that's done nothing on heaven or earth can take away what God has given you.

Don't just shout a few eloquent phrases or pray some lofty, meaningless prayer. Lift up your voice in thanksgiving and praise and let your God know how grateful and thankful you are for Him showing you favor. Shout if you have to, but even a quiet, fervent prayer of thanks if said sincerely is just as effective as shouting and dancing.

Always remember to give God

the glory and the credit for your blessings, no matter how small. If a woman can shout and dance about ten cents, surely you can praise God for granting you the things you desire.

Now that you have the secret to ten cent faith, the next step is to put it into practice. Please review the steps and follow them every time you have a desire or need to be met.

Remember to make sure you follow each step in sequence and take as long as needed to make sure you've completed each one.

The Seven Steps to Ten Cent Faith

1. *Have a burning need.* Faith won't work on a whim. You fuel faith with great passion or great need or perhaps a combination of both. Any time you feel this strongly about something you desire - something that you have to have - put your faith to work.
2. *Acknowledge your need.* Say it if you don't say it to anyone but yourself. You've got to acknowledge what you want and make that acknowledgement known if to no one but you. You may tell someone you know has your best interests at

heart, but be careful with
whom you share your desires.

You don't want to have to
battle the demons of envy and
jealousy while believing for
your desire to be met.

3. *Ask, seek, and knock.* You have
to ask God or you'll be left
to your own devices. Remember
when you ask God to fulfill
your desire, seek in His word
His promises to fulfill your
needs and bless you with
abundance, then knock on His
Gates with tithes or, lacking
money, the sacrifice of
praise, and He will open up
the windows of heaven to pour

you out a blessing that you cannot receive.

4. Live with expectation. Once

you've gone to God, it's done!

Expect with results, not necessarily immediately

because things do not come in our time but in God's. If your

desire does not get realized right away it may be because

you are not yet ready to

receive it. Have you prepared yourself for whatever it is

you desire, physically,

mentally, emotionally, and

spiritually? **Many Christians**

have received blessings they

were not ready for, some not

*even recognizing that they'd
been blessed. Others were so
downtrodden they didn't
believe they deserved a
blessing and refused to
receive it. Be ready to
receive what God has to give
you by living in a state of
expectation.*

5. *Listen to the Holy Spirit.*

There probably won't be a
voice speaking to you or a
bush burning anywhere nearby,
but you may get a "feeling" or
a "hunch" to do something, go
somewhere, or talk to
somebody. If you do and what
you are being led to do does

not violate any spiritual laws
as outlined in the Bible, do
it. The unexpected turn you
take may lead you right to
your desire or the stranger
you meet may tell you where to
find it or the phone call you
take even though you don't
recognize the number on your
caller ID may be someone
telling you that they have got
the very thing you're waiting
for expectantly. Just listen.
If you live with expectation,
you'll be tuned in to the
spiritual realm and it will be
easy to recognize the unction
of the Holy Spirit.

6. *Receive your desire.* This is the easiest step but it is sometimes missed by people who expect their desire to come gift wrapped. It may not even be in the form you expected. Suppose your greatest desire is to be married and you ask God to send you a kind, gentle person with a Christian heart and when you meet that person he or she is in a wheelchair. Are you going to turn him or her away because of a disability? If you do, you will make the biggest mistake of your life. Receive your blessing.

7. *Acknowledge God's role in*

giving you your desire. If you want to hold on to your desire and increase your faith so that the next time you have a burning desire you will have faith strong enough to realize it, don't forget this last and most important conclusion to your spiritual contract with God. You've kept God to His word by seeking it and following it yourself. Now, you have to seal the deal by giving Him the glory and the honor He alone is due. Do this quickly and with all of the rejoicing and exultation you

should feel once you have
realized your greatest desire.
God inhabits praise and you
want Him to be there to see
your joy. Praise Him whatever
way you know how. Just mean
it. Don't pray vain, loud
prayers to impress someone
else when you give your
testimony in church. It would
be better to sit quietly at
home thanking the Lord than to
put on a "show" for others and
forget why you have the thing
you most desire. Acknowledge
God as your source and He will
increase your faith so that
you can obtain whatever you

desire.
